Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

Non-Entitlement Resources include:

Matching requirements for Emergency Solutions Grant and HOME Investment Partnership programs will be satisfied as follows:

- Emergency Solutions Grant matching requirements (100% grant match) will be met by City of Oakland General Purpose Fund allocations to homeless services. Other sources that may be used are Measure Q parcel tax funds (Oakland Parks and Recreation Preservation, Litter Reduction, Homelessness Support Act), and Community Development Block Grant funds for homeless activities.
- 2. HOME Investment Partnership matching requirements (25% grant match or .25 cent per dollar) will be med and exceeded through funds permanently allocated to affordable housing through the City of Oakland's continued 25%-set aside of funds distributed to the City as a taxing entity under the Redevelopment dissolution. These funds are deposited into the City of Oakland Affordable Housing Trust Fund. Since 2015, the Affordable Housing Trust funds receives Boomerang funds on an annual basis to support this effort.

Affordable Housing Trust Fund: The City of Oakland's Redevelopment Agency was dissolved as of February 1, 2012. The State statutes governing the dissolution of redevelopment agencies and the wind-down of redevelopment activities provide for the distribution of former tax-increment funding to taxing entities. These funds are called "boomerang funds" and represent a windfall in property tax revenue to the City of Oakland. In late 2013, the City of Oakland committed to setting aside 25% of the funds distributed to the City as a taxing entity under the Redevelopment dissolution and deposit them into the Affordable Housing Trust Fund. Starting in 2015, the Affordable Housing Trust fund is estimated to receive about \$3 to 4 million on an annual basis with those funds increasing as the wind down of the Oakland Redevelopment Agency proceeds. Additionally, the City is currently collects a Jobs/Housing Commercial Impact fee that, as the economy continues to prosper, is collecting revenue to be used toward supporting 2016 Affordable housing development activities. Finally, the City adopted an Housing Impact Fee on new housing development on May 3, 2016 (Oakland Municipal Code (OMC) Chapter 15.72 (Ordinance No. 13365 C.M.S.). These Impact Fees went into effect for development projects submitting a building permit application on or after September 1, 2016.

Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC): The federal 4% and 9% LIHTC is the principal source of funding for the construction and rehabilitation of affordable rental homes. They are a dollar-for-dollar credit against federal tax liability.

WHEREAS, on May 19, 2020, Oakland City Council accepted and appropriated CDBG CARES Act funds (CDBG-CV) in the amount of \$4,532,841 as part of the First Substantial Amendment to the 2019-20 Annual Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, Title 24, Part 91, Subparts A-C and F of the Code of Federal Regulations (24 C.F.R 91.1, et seq.) requires the City of Oakland to prepare and submit to HUD a Five-Year Consolidated Plan (Con Plan), inclusive of a 2020-21 Annual Action Plan (AAP) in order to receive the award amounts listed above under the CPD formula grant and CARES Act allocations; and

WHEREAS, in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, HUD reduced the citizen participation comment period under 24 CFR section 91.105 from 30 days to 5 days; and

WHEREAS, in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, HUD also waived the public hearing requirements under 24 CFR section 91.105 to allow local jurisdiction to hold virtual public hearings, if social distancing is recommended by health officials, as long citizens are provided reasonable notice and opportunity to comment; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing will be held June 30, 2020 to solicit public comment on the City's Con Plan, which includes categorical allocation of CDBG, HOME, HOPWA, ESG,

HOPWA-CV, ESG-CV and CDBG-CV funds for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21; and

WHEREAS, in FY 2020-21, the City's Department of Housing & Community Development expects to collect \$850,000 in Revolving Loan Program Income from Ioan fees and payments under the City's CDBG-funded Residential Lending and Housing Rehabilitation program; and

WHEREAS, said Revolving Loan Program Income is utilized and reported annually as leveraging for CDBG funds awarded to the City; and

WHEREAS, staff seeks approval to utilize Revolving Loan Program Income collected in excess of the \$850,000 in FY 2019-20 and FY 2020-21 for housing rehabilitation and other CDBG-eligible activities; and

WHEREAS, no more than 7.5 percent of ESG funds and no more than 3 percent of HOPWA funds awarded to the City may be used to cover grantee (the City's) administrative costs; and

WHEREAS, the Community Housing Services Division will be required to pay an estimated \$8,354 in Central Services Overhead costs for the administration of its ESG grant funds and an estimated \$11,522 in Central Service Overhead costs for the administration of its HOPWA grant funds; and

WHEREAS, payment of the Central Services Overhead costs for the administration of its ESG and HOPWA grant funds may cause the Community Housing Services Division to exceed the 7.5% and 3% administrative costs caps for ESG and HOPWA funds, respectively; now therefore be it
